Travel Committee Trip - Wednesday, October 23rd

Ned Smith Center for Nature and Art (10:00 – 11:45) 176 Water Company Road, Millersburg, PA 17061 www.nedsmithcenter.org The Ned Smith Center for Nature and Art celebrates the life and works of its namesake, the nationally recognized wildlife artist, naturalist and writer Ned Smith. The center includes three gallery spaces and a gift shop that are open 10:00 – 4:00. The gallery permanently features selections from the collection of hundreds of original paintings, drawings, field sketches, journal notes and manuscripts.

The center also encompasses more than 500 acres of forest and meadow that stretch from the scenic Wiconisco Creek to the top of Berry's Mountain. The land includes a mature hardwood forest alive with deer, bear, wild turkey, grouse, fox, along with hundreds of species of songbirds, insects and reptiles. The center's lands lie within the corridor for the annual fall migration of hawks, eagles and falcons.

Hiking the 12 miles of trails is permitted from sunrise to sunset. Because hunting is permitted on certain areas of the center's lands, the center strongly encourages everyone using the trails during all hunting seasons to wear orange. Orange vests are available for loan from the gift shop during open hours, Tuesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. – 4 p.m.

Remembering M. Sue Daugherty

Many garden clubs are privileged to have long time members, who, like faithful perennials in our gardens have made their clubs bloom with their support of club goals and objectives. For more than 50 years Sue Daugherty was an active member and past president of Penn-Cumberland Garden Club. She was a Life Member of and served for over 20 years on the board of the Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania and was a Life Member and served for over 16 years on the board of National Garden Clubs. Over those many years, Sue gained a reputation as a nationally recognized environmental educator and helped create the first Environmental Studies Schools, now a part of the educational curriculum of National Garden Clubs.



Sue joined PCGC in 1964 – four years after the club was federated. She led an effort in the 1970s to save an environmentally important recreation area. Stony Creek Valley was scheduled for destruction by an electric company's plan to flood the valley and turn it into a pumped storage facility. With Sue's leadership, Penn-Cumberland led a citizen action with other local environmental organizations to successfully save this beautiful valley. It continues to be enjoyed today by outdoor enthusiasts.

Sue planned and chaired environmental forums that were well attended by the community to highlight issues important to all families. A particularly memorable forum in the 1970s featured Ralph Nader as keynote speaker. Educational exhibits prepared by environmental groups were featured at these popular forums often held in local school auditoriums. Sue was always a tireless warrior for the environment. In 1978 she received the prestigious Gold Seal award from the Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania in honor of her service.

In the 1980s Sue initiated action with other conservation organizations to protect portions of Pennsylvania's Appalachian Trail, keeping Penn-Cumberland in the forefront of "Save the Trail" – another successful achievement to protect portions of the Appalachian Trail from development. During this time, Sue also led a coalition of 57 other organizations to establish a cancer registry in Pennsylvania. This coalition was called "Cancer Cause – the Environmental Connection" and was partly a result of having lost friends and family members to this dreadful disease. Until that time a state registry did not exist and the coalition was formed to correct that.

In 2010, Sue presented an important program for Penn-Cumberland to celebrate the club's fiftieth anniversary. She gave us the privilege of looking back and seeing our club through the eyes of one who had been a member since 1964 – shortly after our club was federated. We did not know at that time that Sue was waging a personal battle against cancer and later that year was confined to a wheelchair. This did not slow her efforts to be a tireless warrior for the environment. She continued to chair the Conservation committee, meeting monthly to learn about and act for environmental issues.

Sue was a Nationally accredited Landscape Design Consultant and a Master Flower Show Judge, served on the board of the Harrisburg Area Civic Garden Center and on the District IV board. She helped organize the historic preservation group which became Friends of Peace Church, served as director of the Pennsylvania Roadside Council, Environmental Chair of the League of Women Voters and promoted National Wildlife Federation, National Audubon Society and other conservation groups in her speaking engagements throughout the country.

In 1986 she received the Environmental Action Leadership Medal from the National Council of State Garden Clubs which was accompanied by this narrative: "M. Sue Daugherty has touched the future with her present and past deeds with an unlimited scope of activities. Environmental concerns have ranged from the Appalachian Trail, the Stony Creek Valley area, plant preservation legislation, the Pennsylvania Education Master Plan to such as "Saving Lives", the Environmental Connection Cancer Cause. She has achieved much personally, but furthermore is blessed with a gift of leading and motivating many individuals and groups to their own involvements and achievements in environmental concerns."

Sue believed, as Aldo Leopold stated that "To save a flower it may be necessary to rescue a planet." Sue devoted a significant portion of her life to environmental education, natural resource conservation and legislation. She initiated numerous successful statewide programs organizing thousands of people of every age, vocation and interest. An as "unpaid" but professional conservationist, Sue earned the respect of countless people both lay and professional. We join Sue's husband, John Ogurcak and her family in mourning their loss and are grateful for her years of service. Penn-Cumberland Garden Club is richer for Sue's many gifts and we will miss her. Horticulture Committee

Welcome back to another exciting year for PCGC! It is our Diamond Jubilee as we are in existence for sixty years. During these sixty years our club has effected positive changes within our community and around the world with allocations and volunteer work made to worthy causes.

The Horticulture committee looks forward to another great year with interesting monthly meetings and fellowship centered around our love for gardening and all it entails.

On September 10th we have scheduled a trip to the Penn State Trial Gardens located at 1446 Auction Road, Manheim, PA 17545 at 11 A.M.

The gardens are living laboratories and garden classrooms for horticulture, plant pathology and entomology. Plants are evaluated during the growing season, information is provided for commercial growers and gardens and field days are held for visual evaluation and tours. If requested, car pools can be formed at the Camp Hill Borough Parking Lot. Directions to the gardens are listed below:

- Take PA 283 east toward Lancaster
- Exit at Esbenshade Road (just past Mt. Joy exit)
- Go left at top of exit ramp.
- o Immediately after crossing over 283, go right on Auction Road.
- o Follow Auction Road to a "T" at Erisman Road. Turn right.
- Follow Erisman Road around the curve and then turn left, back on to Auction Road (just before the covered bridge).
- PSU farm driveway is on the left as you go around the curve. Look for the grey Southeast Agricultural Research & Extension Center sign and a big blue barn roof.
- On October 16th we have scheduled a tour of the Harrisburg Cemetery located at 521 North 13th Street, Harrisburg, PA 17113 at 10 A.M. The Harrisburg Cemetery, formerly known as Mount Kalmia Cemetery, is a prominent rural cemetery and located in the national historic district in Harrisburg. It was officially founded in 1845, although internments took place for many years before. The cemetery is also the burial ground for American Revolutionary War soldiers. Directions to the cemetery are listed below:

Take 581 East

- Continue on the Capital Beltway for 1.4 miles
- Take exit 43 toward the Capitol/2nd Street
- Turn right onto Paxton Street
- o Turn left onto S. Cameron Street
- o Turn right
- o Turn left onto N 13th Street
- The Cemetery is at 521 N 13th Street

We hope you will be able to join us for these interesting and informative tours. A signup sheet will be circulated at the September and October meetings. We are looking forward to seeing you in September and your contributions to another productive year for PCGC.




Books for Libraries

On a trip to Philadelphia to gather information about forming the first Garden Club in Monaco, she discovered that several members were creating pressed flower designs. She returned home and began filling phone books with flowers from the palace grounds. Her Pressed Flower Collages led to a show and a book. Two designs were used for the country's official stamp. And, the Springmaid Company used two other designs in a line of linens. Like many of our own Pressers, she found that Queen Anne's lace and hydrangeas are two of the most useful flowers. And, she used a small paint brush to apply the glue as we do. She felt that completing a design was like doing a jigsaw puzzle while providing a great "feeling of tranquility."

Petite Small Flower Show - Horticulture Only -June meeting - 2020



Heads Up! The **Bloom and Grow Mini-show** for the June meeting will be a petite small flower show for horticulture only. It may or may not be judged, depending on whether it qualifies as a standard flower show (yet to be determined). For horticulture exhibits, a "small" flower show is based on a minimum of five classes in the schedule, and a minimum of twenty exhibits. For horticulture exhibits, "petite" specimens must consist of dwarf, miniature or naturally small specimens.

So why is a June show being described now? To exhibit horticulture, there are **required lengths of possession.** The ones of concern for this show are: Bulbs – 90 days (exception: no minimum for forced bulbs); Perennials – 90 days; Arboreals – 6 months. If you are considering planting some dwarf, miniature or naturally small specimens for the show, **this fall is the time** to do so. The best way to identify dwarf and miniature plants is to read the label. Also, many nurseries place dwarf and miniatures separately. If you already have plants and aren't sure if they qualify, Google them and the plant description will indicate if it is miniature or dwarf.
