

Ames Community Gardens completed their 9th season in 2019 – and then we had **COVID**. 2020 was to be our **10th anniversary**. We were not surprised in March and when The Ames Company did not open the gardens for the season as we were all isolating and attempting to slow the spread of an invisible enemy. We understood the but we could not hide our disappointment. We later offered possibilities for schedules that allow for safe gardening later in the season, asking folks to bring their own tools and water - hoping

that the **129 families** that have plots there would be able to plant some vegetables to feed their families and to counter the food shortages. But it was not to be – the gardens were not allowed to open at all for the 2020 season.

A garden committee of 9 Penn-Cumberland members and 5 community gardeners work together to help maintain the gardens at the Ames Community Gardens in Shiremanstown. We assign plots and keep records of assignments. The Ames Company has provided tools in a permanent storage shed and water stations to make it easy for anyone to garden. The perimeter is fenced to offer security and peace of mind and is locked overnight.

The 129 gardeners include retirees, apartment dwellers, and those who don't have enough space to garden at home. **Extra vegetables** are also donated to **New Hope Ministries.** Last season, over **1000 pounds of vegetables** were donated.

This is a great project for Penn-Cumberland Garden Club to help serve our communities and to spread the seeds of goodwill. We have been here assisting with the gardens since the beginning when we were offered the opportunity by Duane Greenly – then CEO of Ames, who had the vision to create this valuable community asset. Our roots are deep with these gardens.

Growing vegetables is a way for many families to reconnect with the earth – it provides not only food, but helps foster relationship with the earth and with the human community. We have been able to provide **education** by offering **evening outdoor programs** led by local garden experts. We have also provided special plantings for pollinators to illustrate how to do it. It is our hope that when the next garden season begins in spring of 2021, we will be allowed in to the gardens again. We all hope for answers as we learn more about the challenges we face – and we continue to hope that folks in need will again have something fresh to eat from their gardens.

How Does Our Garden Grow?

2020 has been a landmark year for many events that had to be cancelled. One that is particularly ironic is the 50th anniversary of Earth Day. Our president, Susanna, was the Mechanicsburg Earth Day organizer. Not surprisingly, Susanna took a creative spin to save the spirit of the event by offering an online charity auction of rain barrels that were to be on display at the annual street event.

Fifty years ago, on April 22, 1970, 20 million people gathered in the United States for the first Earth Day. It helped build the modern environmental movement by connecting issues that people had treated separately. Today we have an even broader set of issues – species loss, climate change and pandemics such as COVID-19. This pandemic may seem disconnected from environmental problems, but it is related. Health experts and biologists have warned for years about our lack of immunity to innumerable viruses circulating in the wild. Destroying ecosystems increases our exposure to animals carrying these viruses and globalization helps to spread them around the world. Habitat and species loss, forest destruction, air pollution and poor nutrition add to the burdens of our world. We all can see connections among diverse conditions such as climate change and habitat and land degradation with severe droughts, wildfires and violent storms.



We, as gardeners and people who value the blessings of nature recognize the problems and we need to work together to try to correct them. We can demand responses from our elected officials and from the companies where we shop. We need efforts from government agencies, corporations and other institutions to build a broad culture of preparedness, protections, monitoring and care and make our systems better able to respond when harmful events do occur.








Summer Reading Suggestions from Joyce Wallen





The Well-Tended Perennial Garden details essential practices of perennial care including deadheading, pinching, cutting back, thinning, disbudding and dead leaving.
