My Dear PCGC Friends,

What a rollercoaster of a year! I have screamed "off" several times now, yet it just doesn't let up! What a wild ride! The health and vibrancy of any business or club will be reflected throughout this year by their ability to carry on in the face of this pandemic and I am pleased to say PCGC is a vibrant organization! The club will gently phase into our regular meetings in the coming months. Much consideration has been given to whether we should meet, where we should meet, should food be served, and what safety measures need to be in place to have a healthy meeting environment. None of these decisions were made lightly.



The membership survey determined that the majority would be comfortable meeting outdoors under a pavilion. We have found a pavilion large enough where we can seat 3 masked members per six foot table. This area also has plenty of level parking and a lovely large restroom with sinks for hand washing. We plan to have our September and October meetings outdoors but under a pavilion with a portable microphone in place. Additionally, we will host the business meeting and the program via zoom so that if a member is uncomfortable attending in person they can still participate through this online platform, from the safety of home, utilizing either a smart phone or computer. For our first two fall outdoor meetings, no food will be served but members are invited to pack a lunch to enjoy and socialize after the meeting, if they choose.

All PCGC events will require the use of mask as per the Department of Health and Governor Wolf's guidelines. While we recognize this is uncomfortable for some it keeps us all safer. If you must unmask for a moment, we ask that you please step a minimum of 10 feet away from any people and this large park has the space to do so. Much thought is being given to health safety – whether it be physical distancing, masks, wearing gloves or sanitizing shared pens between use – committee members are determined to keep each of us safe while we phase into our 2020-2021 garden club year.

Read this newsletter carefully as you will find many committees have exciting walks, workshops and informative meetings However, I certainly respect your decision to not attend at this time. Do know, PCGC will be here when you are ready to come back, because we are a vibrant organization!

Civic Beautification



PCGC applied to The Garden Club Federation of PA (GCFP) for a **Seed Money Grant** to help finance Civic Beautification's project at the **Frankenberger Tavern** in Mechanicsburg. GCFP awarded us \$75. The Federation received 49 applications. PCGC was one of 9 recipients in District IV.

The Frankenberger Tavern Project involves creating a 1800's garden on a lot beside the Tavern where a house burned down. Plus, we will be moving a Herb Garden that PCGC members have maintained for years to the new garden site. Currently, The Village Restorations and Consulting Company is working on the Tavern building. A small "log cabin" building has been built that that will contain an employee rest room and a tool shed. Once the ground has been graded and soil prepared, the Civic Beautification Committee will work with the Cumberland County Redevelopment Authority to design and plant the garden.

It was our great good fortune that upon her retirement as Superintendent of Perkiomen Valley School District in Montgomery County, Carole was ready to pursue her interest in gardening in 2002. Our Central Area Landscape Design Council was holding Landscape Design School classes at Lycoming College in Williamsport in July of that year. Carole read the article we had placed in the local newspaper advertising the course for those who might be interested and she called to enroll. From that time on, she became an active member of Penn-Cumberland. Never one to shy away from a challenge, Carole went on to attend not only all of the National Garden Club schools, but to achieve Master status in each - making her one of the first 5 Star Members – quite an accomplishment!

Never one to take the "easy" path, Carole began her college education after having 4 children. Her husband, Bill, was her biggest fan and encouraged her to attend HACC where she earned her Associate Degree. From there she continued her education at York College earning her BS with Valedictorian honors. She then earned her Master's degree at Millersville and her Doctorate degree at University of Pennsylvania. With young children, Carole was involved with their education, serving as teacher's aide and reading assistant, then as an elementary teacher and Reading Specialist with West Shore School District. As she continued her education, she became Principal and Assistant Superintendent at Columbia School District. When she received her Doctorate, she became Superintendent at Annville-Cleona School District and later retired as Superintendent of Perkiomen Valley School District.

After retirement, she pursued her interest in gardening and took the classes and steps to become a Master Gardener. She was also an accomplished artist and pursued her passion for painting. As a member of Penn-Cumberland, Carole served in many leadership capacities – chairing flower shows, Civic Development Committee and Central PA Landscape Design Council, among others. She helped with the work of several committees. Until Bill began to have serious health issues, Carole was an active participant in the workings of PCGC. After Bill's passing, Carole began to have health issues, but still made efforts to attend meetings when she was able, with help from a kind friend – Andrea Campbell. Parkinson's Disease took Carole much too soon.



Library Liaison Book Review



Anna Pavord's internationally bestselling sensation, *The Tulip*, is the story of a flower that has driven men mad. Greed, desire, anguish, and devotion have all played their part in the development of the tulip into a worldwide phenomenon. Today, the United States alone imports three thousand million tulip bulbs each year.
