FROM YOUR PRESIDENT



Now that spring is upon us we are busier than usual. In addition to working in my own yard, I have been busy attending many garden club activities. The Annual Spring Board Meeting of District IV Garden Club of Federation was held April 5th. The Chambersburg Garden Club hosted this meeting at The Orchards Restaurant in Chambersburg. The program was presented by the Conococheague Audubon Society. We saw stunning photographs of many common Pennsylvania birds in nesting season and in winter. The presentation highlighted food and habitat preferences that we can provide in our gardens, yards, meadows and woodlots.

The Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania will hold their 88th Annual Meeting April 15-17 in Washington, Pennsylvania. The Theme is *"A Floral Trifecta"*. Mechanicsburg's own George Weigle is the luncheon speaker. His program is titled *"How to Grow Your Dinner"*. On Thai will present the dinner program, *"On With Winning Design"*. Tuesday we will attend the Judges Council Program and luncheon. Lynn Frank will present a program on *"Winners Through the Years...Creative Designs"*. In addition to these programs there will be various workshops.

Earth Day is Sunday, April 22nd. It will be celebrated in downtown Mechanicsburg on Saturday, April 21st. Our Conservation committee will have their usual booth and will be accepting for recycling hard plastic bottle lids and plastic spray bottle tops. Other booths will be accepting various other items to be recycled. Go to mechanicsburgearthdayfest.com and click on the recycling link to see what else you can take that day. The First United Methodist Church will be accepting electronic recyclables and shredding from 9 a.m. to noon at the parking lot. A company specializing in electronic recycling will perform 100% data destruction on media stored on the recycled electronics. Note, there is a \$10 fee to recycle CRT monitors and a \$25 fee to recycle CRT televisions, payable in cash only.

Friday, April 27th, at 2:30 p.m. will be a tree dedication ceremony at the Trails and Trees Environmental Center in Mechanicsburg. Trees to honor several of our members are to be dedicated. Details are in Susan Wilder's article in this newsletter.

May's big event is the 89th National Garden Club's convention in Philadelphia, *"Love Blooms in Philadelphia."* It is May 20 – 24. All club members in our state are receiving a special rate for the registration fee of only \$10! Spend a day (or more) at the Convention...sign up for a tour or learn from one of our seminar speakers. Join us for lunch and/or dinner and enjoy the camaraderie of fellow gardeners. HORTICULTURE TIPS FOR SPRING JULY 14TH GARDEN TOUR

Finally Spring is here and we can continue to get our gardens ready for summer splendor. We need to be aware of the weather forecasts, trends and warnings for April and May. If a frost or cold weather is in the forecast, protect your tender plants with mulch, newspapers, light cloth or some type of overnight protection. If the weather is sunny and dry, don't neglect watering. Most flowers and shrubs need about an inch of water each week and newly planted seedlings especially. They will perish if their roots dry out. It is still okay to fertilize your trees, shrubs and roses. Early flowering deciduous shrubs should be pruned back when they have finished blooming. Here are a few more hints for this month:

- * Work lime in the soil around Hydrangeas for pink flowers or aluminum sulphate for blue blooms.
- * Keep roses free of aphids and other pests and diseases.
- * Pinch off new growth on pines and conifers to keep them compact.
- * Lightly prune lilacs after they finish blooming. May is the time to feed them with 10-10-10 fertilizer.
- * Summer flowering bulbs can be planted this month.
- * Promptly remove spent flowers from any plant unless you intend to harvest the seeds.
- * Be sure to use pollinator friendly weed and pest control agents.



As you are busily creating and working in your garden landscapes these next few months, please set time aside to attend our **Plant America Beautiful Garden Tour on July 14 from 10 a.m. – 5 p.m.** There will be six or more **Mechanicsburg gardens** featured including an historic home and estate. Some of the gardens will feature music, wine tasting, and artists in action. **The Rosemary House Garden, The Frankenberger Herb Garden and the Ames True Temper Community Gardens will also be featured.** The Frankenberger Tavern will be open for tours and our **Pressed Flower Designers** will be selling merchandise there. The cost of a ticket is \$15 prior to the Tour and \$17 Day of the Tour. ARBOR DAY CELEBRATION



Friday, April 27th is National Arbor Day. PCGC will be having a celebration at Trail and Trees Environmental Center, 1731 York Street, Mechanicsburg, PA 17055 at 2:30 PM to dedicate trees that have been planted in honor of three of our members. The dedication will be held at 2:30 PM. There will also be a nature walk led by Paul Garrett and refreshments.

As the recipient of the Perennial Bloom Award in 2016, Sue Daugherty chose a River Birch to be planted near the vernal pond at Trails and Trees. Sue's tree joins another previously dedicated tree for Pearl Kent. 2017 Perennial Bloom Award recipient Susan Wilder chose a Pond Cypress which has also been planted near the vernal pond. Judy McGinnis selected a Dawn Redwood as her President's tree and it was also planted at Trails and Trees in 2017.

As members of Penn-Cumberland, we know that trees provide many health and medical benefits to people, including changes in blood pressure and muscle tension. The United States Forest Service has done studies that show that tree-filled neighborhoods lower levels of domestic violence and are safer and more sociable. One hundred mature trees catch approximately 139,000 gallons of rainwater and remove 53 tons of carbon dioxide and 430 pounds of other air pollutants each year. Trees remove particulate matter from the air, which helps to ease or prevent respiratory disease. Trees have many benefits in addition to their beauty. Penn-Cumberland's tradition of planting trees to honor our presidents and award recipients is a perfect way to share our commitment to the value of trees and improving our communities.

AMES COMMUNITY GARDENS



Gardening is the great multitasker: Not only does it count as exercise, burning up to 200 calories per half-hour, but research shows this hobby is the perfect stress-reducer and mood booster. All this and fresh veggies!

Penn-Cumberland Garden Club members manage the day-to-day operation of this remarkable garden hub that has begun its eighth season this year. These gardens are an important part of the community providing garden plots for families to grow their own vegetables in a protected, pesticide-free environment. There are 129 organic garden plots planted and harvested by local gardeners and over 1000 pounds of vegetables were donated to New Hope Ministries from the gardens last summer.

The gardens were established in 2011 by a grant from Castle-Harland, Inc., then parent company of Ames True Temper, Inc. employing over 700 people. Duane Greenly, then owner of Ames and his wife, Sue had the vision and foresight to plan these gardens, including a storage shed with a supply of garden tools and a free supply of water with hoses and reels located to reach all plots. The perimeter is fenced to offer security and peace of mind. Gardeners include retirees, apartment dwellers and those who don't have space to garden at home.

Ames formed a partnership with Penn-Cumberland Garden Club to be the stewards of the gardens. PCGC members Francesca McNichol and Amy Hatfield were the first co-chairs who built the relationship with Ames and established the organization of the gardens which continues today. The Community Garden Committee is now made up of 10 Penn-Cumberland members and 6 community gardeners who work together to maintain the integrity of the gardens, assign plots and keep records. The committee also maintains the flower beds and pollinator gardens around the garden plots, arranges for speakers to help gardeners learn how to be successful and survey the gardens each week to ensure the plots are kept in good shape. Susan Wilder and Doris Smith serve as co-chairs for this busy community garden with the help of Gloria Basehore, Ann Burnett, Nancy Carberry, Duane and Sue Greenly, Ann Glasscock, Sheri Goff, Francesca McNichol and Donna Royal and six community gardeners.

Each garden season, these gardens come to life with food crops and colorful flowers that beautify a former industrial lot and help to provide food for the families of the gardeners that work to nurture and grow these unique garden plots.

The Ames Company was established in 1774 and has been a part of gardening in America since before the founding of our country and is the leading North American manufacturer and marketer of non-powered lawn and garden tools, wheelbarrows and other outdoor work products to the retail and professional markets.
